# What outcomes can families expect for their child in early learning?

It's natural for families to discuss with friends what their young children are doing and learning in early childhood education and care. But it can be unsettling too and it can prompt many questions for early childhood educators, directors and managers. In this blog, DR WENDY BOYD demystifies 'real learning' and developmental milestones. She examines ACECQA's five domains checklist to make it easier to identify and demonstrate for families what quality early learning experiences look like for children aged three to five years.

Families often have different expectations for their three- to five-year-old children when they attend an early learning centre or similar service. Some parents expect their child to engage in academic learning activities or 'real learning'. They associate academic activities with formal school-based learning such as writing, reading and knowing their numbers.

#### NURSERY NEWS

To celebrate this day all our children and teachers were wearing something white. We also decorated our playground with white balloons and white string. The children were very excited when the teachers were

#### Reading books

Reading books is a comforting and relaxing experience. Babies enjoyed reading books with the teachers and loved seeing the pictures in the book. Reading helps build their knowledge of the world in a creative way.



(Learning outcome: 5:2A: Listen and respond to sounds and patterns in speech, stories and rhymes in context.)

We are continuing to learn about shapes, colours and numbers. We will try to build the babies' knowledge regarding some aspects such as:

- Helping to pack away indoor toys
- Sharing
- Cooperating with other children

Babies are also busy having fun drawing on the chalkboard, playing dress-ups, exploring the home corner area and much more.

#### **Ocean Life Visit**

We had a visit from Ocean Life Experience. We learned about sea molluscs, turtles, baby sharks, sea cucumbers and starfish. It was a hands-on experience providing an opportunity to touch and feel the starfish, sea cucumber and sea molluscs.

# TODDLER NEWS

#### Introducing Awareness Days

We introduced the toddlers to some ideas and awareness days that provided fun and educational experiences for the children.' Our goal was for the children and families to experience an environment where they could affirm and extend connecting with the wider world. We also encouraged the children and families to feel comfortable with routines, customs and regular events. At the Centre, for the last two months we had White Ribbon Day, Red N Nose Day, Crazy Hair Day and also Talk Like a Pirate Day.







Spring has sprung. The toddlers were very active with their physical and fine motor skills. In the last few months they have been engaging in a lot of activities involving fine motor skills. These are the skills that allow them to use their hands to manipulate materials like pencils, containers, clothing fasteners, and little objects. There is so much more to it, though! Areas of development like pinch and grip strength, separation of the sides of the hand and fingers isolation all play a role in refined use of the fingers and hands. Fine motor skills are necessary for every task that a child completes. From play, self-care, to managing clothing fasteners, and colouring, motor skill development

is needed for every aspect. Fine motor skill development is essential to pencil grasp and handwriting. The activities they liked most were playing with magnetic tiles, chalk drawing, playdough and collage activities.

#### JUNIOR KINDY NEWS

The Junior Kindy children are enjoying their learning journey with their friends and educators. We are providing rich meaningful learning experiences to the children to

enhance their overall development. Here is the summary of children's learning for the last few weeks:

**Nature:** The children love to play outside and exploring nature. They have been very interested in looking for insects in the garden. They found some caterpillars, spiders and grasshoppers. So, we followed up



with children's interests and organised different activities to intentionally teach them about different types of insects. We also discussed about eating habits of insects. An insect garden was set up in the room for children to learn more about insects.

**On the farm: Evander** and **Thomas** showed interest in animals. They loaded some animals on a farm and told the teacher that they were taking these animals to the farm. We set up an indoor farm and children moved their animals on that farm. We talked about pets and wild animals to develop children's understanding about the habitats of animals.

**Sea Life:** The Ocean Life show visited the service, giving the children a chance to touch and feel some sea creatures and explore relationships with other living things (*Learning outcome 2.4F*). The children learned that they should never

throw any rubbish in the sea as it can cause harm to sea animals, so they promised not to discard rubbish into the sea. They also learned that a shark's mouth is a teeth factory. Whenever shark's teeth fall out, they are replaced by new teeth naturally. So, a shark never runs out of teeth throughout its life.



Healthy eating: To promote healthy eating, we organised activities to explicitly teach children the health benefits of eating fruits and vegetables. We showed some fruits to the children and asked them about their favourite fruits and vegetables. The children decided



to eat fruits and vegetables every day. Later, children performed pretend cooking in the home corner where they used toy fruits and vegetables for their cooking.

**Rainbow house:** Rainbow house is a popular area in the junior kindy room where children relax on the pillows, play with the toy babies and read books. They love to spend time in the rainbow house.

#### KINDY NEWS Bees and Honey

The children were curious about honeycomb. Mr Andrew did some investigating and after speaking to



a local beekeeper from Suburbeea Honey, Mr Andrew was able to help the children understand where honeycomb comes from. Mr Andrew explained how bees

collect nectar from flowers and take it back to the hive. In the hive that is where the honey is made by all the busy bees. Mr Andrew was able to borrow a beehive drawer from the hive, some beekeeper books, some beeswax and some honey to show the children. After the discussion the children watched an educational video on how honeycomb and honey is made and then had the opportunity to taste the honey from





the local area. The children really enjoyed the honey tasting experience.



#### **Pirates**

Arghhhh, Here be pirates!! The children celebrated Pirate Day in style. The dav started with everyone arriving in their best pirate outfit. Hats, bandanas, evepatches, face painting and other accessories were made



available to the children. Louis brought a pirate flag that he

made at home, and we attached it to the fort which became our pirate ship. The children went on a treasure hunt after they found a map in the playground and with the help of the educators after searching far and wide the children made a discovery in the sand. In the sand they found some



pirate treasure that we all shared together.



# Fruit Bats

The children were hanging upside down on the bars of the play equipment. "We are fruit bats!" said Emily. Mr Andrew followed this up with an introduction into fruit bats using inquiry and discussion. The children shared their thoughts on fruit bats and then Mr Andrew extended their through diagrams and educational understanding information. The children then made bats from paper plates and explored the shape of bats. The children learnt lots of fun facts about bats using an educational program called Sci Show Kids.

#### Let's go fly a kite

The children were very interested in the kite that came from the bookman. We took the kite outside and as a class we looked at it and the paper that came with it in the package. Mr Andrew explained that the paper was called instructions and the instructions help you to understand how something goes together. We watched a short educational video on kites and how they fly and then as a class we put the kite together. It was a nice windy day which was great weather for kite flying so we set up the kite and it lifted into the air.

Parents are reported to feel concerned if they visit their friend's home and see their friend's child brings home worksheets (for example dot-to-dot of their name, colouring in of Easter eggs, or other adult-directed products) from their early childhood service. They may worry their child is being left behind because their child is 'only playing' and not engaging in real learning.

Other parents focus on their child being safe and secure in a stimulating environment where children make choices about what they will play. Such learning environments are supported by educators who are responsive to the child, and socially construct the child's play.

The tension lies between teacher-directed activities where children are perceived to be doing 'real learning', as opposed to children making choices to play according to their interests.

#### So, what should three- to five-year-olds be learning?

Developmental milestones provided by the Australian Children's Early Childhood Quality Authority (ACECQA) state:

Children's learning is ongoing and each child will progress towards the outcomes in different and equally meaningful ways.

This milestones checklist covers five domains of learning, which is linked to the curriculum and the National Quality Standards:

- 1. physical
- 2. social
- 3. emotional
- 4. cognitive
- 5. language development.

The checklist indicates what a child should be able to do by a certain age, and this is linked to the early childhood education curriculum.
